As a part of a world class clinical and research referral center, we are happy to partner with the ECD Global Alliance to bring increased awareness, education, clinical and research efforts to the field."



ECD is a challenging illness that requires physicians across specialties to diagnose and treat patients. The disease can affect the brain, bones, lungs, heart, and kidneys in dissimilar ways from patient to patient. Referral care centers provide the most up-to-date treatment available from doctors interested in helping ECD sufferers.

The ECDGA has facilitated the ECD Referral Care Center network since 2015. Including the North Carolina center, there are now 31 centers willing and able to treat ECD patients. These institutions are committed to having a team of specialists available to provide the best care to ECD patients.
